Updated CSKMS Grant Policies

So that we may be consistent with our purposes as outlined in the CSKMS bylaws, the Board of Directors in October, 2019, has established the following policies for the granting of funds to organizers of crank-ins. They include:

- (1) Individual grants may be of any amount up to a maximum of \$500. See below for the crank-in expenses that may and may not be covered with CSKMS funds.
- (2) Grant applications must be received by CSKMS no less than 60 days prior to the proposed date of the crank-in.
- (3) Applicants must be current CSKMS members in good standing although we do not require that all crank-in attendees be members. This is consistent with our stated purposes to grow the craft, to promote education in the use of circular sock knitting machines, and to provide information and services to the entire CSM community.
- (4) Applicants must agree to inform crank-in attendees of CSKMS support of the event and to make available during the event information about CSKMS
- (5) Applicants must agree to provide photos and a written article about the crank-in for publication in the CSKMS newsletter.
- (6) If approved, half the amount requested will be disbursed before the crank-in. The other half will be released after the treasurer receives receipts documenting expenditures and the newsletter editor receives the photos and written article. If these are not provided, applicants must agree to reimburse to CSKMS the funds already received.
- (7) We will provide no more than one grant per year up to a maximum of 3 consecutive years to support any particular crank-in. This is to ensure that funds are available to the greatest number of interested members as well as to make funds available to organizers of new crank-ins
- (8) CSKMS accepts no liability for damages or injuries that may occur or be alleged to have occurred before, during or after any crank-in. Organizers are strongly encouraged to purchase liability insurance to cover their events.
- (9) The Board of Directors reserves the right to approve or disapprove any grant request for reasons consistent with the CSKMS bylaws and to change these policies at any time it deems necessary. The Board also reserves the right to decline new grant requests whenever funds are not available. Once adopted, these policies and any subsequent changes will be published to the members on the CSKMS website and in an issue of the CSKMS newsletter.

CSKMS grant funds may be used <u>only</u> for the following purposes when hosting a crank-in. If you receive a CSKMS grant for these purposes, you will be required to provide documentation (receipts) to show that the money was spent in these ways.

- (1) Venue Costs -- If the location where you host the crank-in charges a fee for the use of its room(s), you may apply grant funds to this purpose. These may include (but not be limited to) conference centers, hotels, motels, resorts, church halls, museums, libraries, community centers, short-term rental homes (such as Airbnb or vrbo), etc. Retail store locations are not considered ideal and will be considered only on a case-by-case basis. Be prepared to provide receipts for these expenses.
- (2) Instructional Costs -- You may apply CSKMS grant funds to the hiring of teachers providing CSM instruction at crank-ins. If instructional fees are charged to students, all such fees must accrue entirely to the instructor before CSKMS grant funds are applied to the underwriting of education costs. CSKMS grant funds may be used for transportation or lodging (but not meals) for instructors as well as rental fees for AV equipment. Be prepared to provide receipts for these expenses.
- (3) CSM Maintenance/Mechanic Costs -- You may apply CSKMS grant funds to the hiring of mechanics who are attending the crank-in to assist attendees with adjusting or repairing their sock knitting machines. If fees are charged to attendees for this service, all such fees must accrue entirely to the mechanic before CSKMS grant funds are applied to this expense. CSKMS grant funds may be used for transportation or lodging (but not meals) for mechanics. Be prepared to provide receipts for these expenses.
- (4) Advertising/Printing Costs -- You may use CSKMS grant funds for advertising your event or printing of flyers and/or class handouts. Be prepared to provide receipts for these expenses.

The following items are <u>not</u> eligible for reimbursement with CSKMS grant funds.

- (I) Any payment, salary or profit to organizers of the crank-in expressly for their services in organizing the event whether the organizer is a person or persons, an organization, a hobby group, or a business.
- (2) Any payment, salary or profit to any person or business who is functioning as a vendor at the crank-in such as those selling yarn, sock machines, CSM accessories and tools, or any other products. However, if such a person is also functioning as an instructor or mechanic during the crank-in, CSKMS grant funds may be used as outlined above for their educational or mechanical services only.
- (2) Any lodging, transportation or meals costs incurred by attendees.
- (3) Any food or beverages provided for organizers or attendees during the crank-in.
- (4) Any damage deposit before the event or damage expenses assessed after the event.
- (5) Any entertainment (such as music) or services (such as massages) not directly related to the primary purposes of a crank-in.
- (6) Any other item the Board considers inappropriate or inconsistent with its bylaws.



Second Annual Crank-In On in Spokane!

September 19-22, 2019 at Bear Creek Lodge on Mt. Spokane by Kathy Howland

e had 30 crankers attend, from the most novice person to very experienced crankers. They came from near and far—Washington, Oregon, California, Missouri, Idaho, and Montana. We had several from the Canadian provinces as well.

Steve Ashton also attended to provide technical support and guidance to everyone for cylinder and ribber timing. A grant from CSKMS made this possible again this year and is greatly appreciated.

Our first project was knitting nametag lanyards. Everyone was paired up so that a beginner was working with someone more experienced. It was great fun to see everyone interacting with each other! See pattern below.

Door prizes where donated by Cascade Yarns, Brown Sheep Company, and many attendees. We had a lot of fun handing them all out and everyone went home with at least one prize.



In addition, two of the attendees, Debbie Martinez made embroidered tote bags and Karen Ramel made Universal Cast-On bonnets for everyone to take home.

Knitting Fever Inc. donated yarn for our charity project this year. We made headbands for Cancer Care Northwest. We will be donating over 25 to them to hand out to cancer patients.

Classes started each day at I Iam and the last one was at 5pm. We covered cylinder & ribber timing, yarn gauge demo, cast on bonnet knit along, no wrap (suicide) heel, coin purses two ways, kitchener stitch and tiny socks. Cheryl James did our demo for tiny socks and made one for everyone to take home! We allowed time between each class for everyone to have time to practice what they had just learned.

We also had two classes on Kitchenering—one from the inside and from the outside. Those that participated had actual "toes" so they could practice the technique while it was still fresh in their minds.

Hook & Needle Nook was also present with all their great yarns! They even had a special dye lot of sock yarn by Expression Fiber Arts called Lilac City. It knits like butter on a csm!

The sample/project table was a great success again. We had samples of various heels, selvedges, coin purses, mittens, ribbed socks, no show heel tab socks, Mobius scarf and keyhole scarf, just to name a few. I think it was a great help to everyone to be able to see what the completed item could like and compare with their own items.

For projects this year, we had supplies on hand for coin purses, with clasp or snap, Christmas ornaments, and split rings for bonnets.

I-Cord Name Tag Lanyard

-Kathy Howland

Materials

- D Swivel Trigger Clip Hook
- Sock Weight Yarn
- Clear Plastic Horizontal Name Tag Card Holder



Directions

- 1. Remove all but four (4) needles from the machine.
- 2. Hang cast-on bonnet and crank several rows of waste yarn. You can either go back and forth or round and round. Heel spring should be engaged.
- 3. Add project yarn and crank approximately 36" or 225 rows.
- 4. Carefully remove cast-on bonnet and pull out waste yarn to reveal the four (4) stitches of project yarn.
- 5. Hang hem
- 6. Crank 10 rows. Add waste yarn and crank several rows. Remove from machine.
- 7. Slip D swivel onto i-cord, and bring end up to where you previously joined the two ends and sew together.
- 8. Finish ends.

3rd Annual StevenBe Soctoberfest Crank-In Weekend

Minneapolis, MN October 5 & 6, 2019

StevenBe in Minneapolis, Minnesota, is one of the biggest, best -known, and most creative yarn/knitting studios in the country. On October 5th & 6th, StevenBe hosted a special cranker -centric event which has become an annual gathering where a small group of crankers take over the main floor of the renovated 1800s firehouse and share their love of CSMs.

This unique setting brings together traditional knitters and other types of fiber artists in an inclusive, welcoming, environment and is a destination to many traveling craftspeople.

In addition to the general crank-in, Jamie Mayfield and Sue Vunesky were brought in as instructors and offered two different one-on-one sessions:

Specialized Help Sessions where students brought their own machine and could get help to tune their ribber, troubleshoot a specific problem, or taking their cranking to the next level.

Crank-n-Take Session with no experience necessary, where students could sit with Jamie or Sue and be walked through making a pair of socks to take home the same day.

WEEKEND HIGHLIGHTS INCLUDED:

- Crankers came from Green Bay, WI, Illinois, Missouri, and greater Minnesota. Many regular store customers participated; some were known crankers, and some revealed themselves.
- The new format of help sessions and crank-n-take was a huge added aspect to this event where people could choose how they could participate depending on their level of interest. This was the first time the instructors did anything like this and while it was exhausting for them, they were also inspired by the enthusiasm of the people they worked with individually.
- Crank-n-Take sessions filled up very fast. Registrants were thrilled that they could get their hands
 on a machine and go home with a pair of socks they made. Also, an added kitchener lesson, by Ann
 Meminger, was a nice bonus.
 - The one-on-one help sessions were also a big hit. A few registrants expressed that they may have given up on their machine entirely if it hadn't been for the help they received during their session.
 - Energy in the shop was upbeat and positive. It felt like the "place to be" where knitters of all types come together.

The crank-in is held in a vacant store in the Northbridge Mall. 40 crankers attended over the 3-day event. They traveled from, all over Minnesota, Montana, Iowa, Nebraska, Wisconsin, Illinois, Colorado, Texas, Indiana, and Massachusetts. The experience level extended from newbies through seasoned crankers. It was great meeting old friends and making new ones.

It is so awesome to see how everyone pitches in to help each other with answering questions, fixing stitches that run, how to do something on a pattern, and the list goes on. The noise level in the room with people talking and machines cranking was inspiring.

Amy Lonczak, from the Lamb Knitting Co., from Chicopee, MA attended and there were three LT 150 CSM's brought by people attending. Amy shared some of the history around the Lamb Knitting Co., which was very interesting, and demonstrated how the LT 150 worked.

Our CSM demonstrators were Jill Colbert, Bonnie Cummings, Jan Dwyer, Lisa Hanesworth, Amy Lonczak, Carol Mancuso, Deb Oswald, Vickie Storlie, and Anita Trapp-Warner. Anita and Cheri Berberich showed the tatting.

DEMONSTRATIONS INCLUDED: IxI Selvage on a 54/36, Cup Cozy, Different Take on Unknitting, Fancy Stitches, Flat Knitting, Flat Thumb Mitten Knit Along, Kiss Clasp Purse, Lace Patterns, Making and Joining Hexiflats, Swirls, and Tuck Knitting with Beads.

With the Fancy Stitches, which are written up in the old manuals, Deb Oswald explained how the stitches were made, interpreting the old instructions. We also had an impromptu class for those wanting to learn how to do Tatting.

We made socks, knotted headbands, mittens, tiny socks, ornaments, cup cozies, Kiss Clasp, and purses to name a few. According to a post on Facebook a knotted headband gang might have been started. The headbands were fast and easy to make.



Bubble Stitch Socks

-assembled by Zoe Cohen

The stitch pattern is found in antique CSM manuals. Deb Oswald demonstrated several patterns at LAMBS, while *clarifying* the wordiness of old pattern writing.

NOTES

This pattern works on a cylinder divisible by four (4). Test your yarn and tension—the pattern pulls in.

PATTERN

One pattern repeat is four (4) stitches and ten (10) rounds.

RI & R2

Repeat around: 2 up, 2 down (2 needles out of work, 2 needles in work)

R3-R5

With all needles in work, knit all needles

R6 & R7


Repeat around: 2 down, 2 up (2 needles in work, 2 needles out of work)

R8-RI0

With all needles in work, knit all needles

SOCK INSTRUCTONS

- I. Make hung hem cuff.
- 2. Knit one round.
- 3. Begin pattern.
- 4. Knit 8 -10 vertical repeats for desired length (80-100 rounds).
- 5. Knit 8 pre-heel rounds (no pattern).
- 6. Make preferred heel, foot, & toe.
- 7. Kitchener, and gift or wear!


